Pecan Graham Bars

24 graham cracker squares

½ C brown sugar

½ C butter or margarine

½ C chopped pecans

Arrange crackers in a foil-lined 10 x 15 x 1 pan. Melt butter; stir in sugar and pecans. Spread evenly over graham crackers. Bake at 350 for 8 to 10 minutes. While still warm, cut each cracker in half. Cool on rack. Makes 48 bars.

The “Quilters for Comfort” are requesting Patriotic Embroidered Blocks for the Quilt Drive in July.

Quilters For Comfort” is a group of ladies who make quilts for people needing comfort. We are a group of embroiders who met on ATW site and make monthly quilts for charity’s. We have a photo gallery you can view to see some of the wonderful quilts we have given away. All our work is volunteer. www.quiltersforcharity.com

This group of ladies will travel and meet in Kansas City, Kansas for a second historic week of sewing and friendship from July 20th thru the 24th, 2009. While at SewFest '09 we will construct and quilt patriotic quilts for our veterans and wounded soldiers.

We need your help!

We need a large number of quilt blocks in order to make a large number of quilts in a short period of time. Here are the details of what we need in terms of quilt blocks...

Material: any 100% pre-washed cotton fabric red, white or blue, solid or tone on tone Cut into a 9 inch square or larger. Embroider a design in the center of the block. Any patriotic design is good. Designs stating a particular branch of the military are a little harder to incorporate, but we can still use them. You can make one block or as many as you like. And you can make the same design on on many blocks as the blocks will go into the block bank and get used in many different quilts.

We also are in need of what we call “filler blocks”. A filler block is a pieced quilt block that we use with the embroidered blocks to make the quilts look nicer and stretch the embroidered blocks into more quilts. We use simple patterns like the 4 patch, the half square triangle, the rail fence, or Stack N Whack. These blocks need to be a finished size of either 8 ½ or 10 ½ inches square. We would love to have them in sets of 10 to do a complete quilt but even a few would help a lot. These blocks should be made of any 100% cotton pre-washed fabric in Red/white/ blue color schemes.

Reference: **Hanger Cover** Original Source: **Andrea English**

This pattern is designed to fit over a standard plastic tube hanger.

Instructions: Cut 2 on fold. Press down 3/8" at top of each piece. Fold under raw edge and hem. Place front and back pieces with right sides together. Sew sides and bottom with 1/4" seam allowance. Clip curves. Turn right side out, press, hem.

Hanger Cover

This is a simple project that is useful and pretty. If you have light-weight sweaters or clothing with spaghetti straps, this is a great way to keep them on their hangers. I don't have a huge amount of closet space, and those padded hangers take up too much room so I designed this hanger cover to slip over an inexpensive plastic tube hanger (like Joan Crawford, I hate wire hangers).

Materials: Pretty much whatever fabric you want. I chose unbleached muslin.

Cut two pieces on the fold.

Note: If you are planning to embroider a design on your hanger cover, it's easiest to transfer the image before you sew the pieces together. You can either embroider the design now, or wait until you've sewn it together.

Press down 3/8" from top and hem - this will be the opening for the hanger neck.

With right sides together, sew the front and back together at the sides (1/4" seam allowance). Make sure to reinforce the seams at the neck edge.

Turn right side out and press. Hem.
